## Orioles, Ravens—and Penguins

A FLOCK OF BIRD NEWS IS HATCHING AT THE MARYLAND ZOO

**PUT AWAY YOUR** Orioles orange and Ravens purple. When the Maryland Zoo reopens for the season full time on March 1, Baltimore's aviary pride will be black and white along Penguin Coast, the state-of-the-art African black-footed penguin exhibit that premiered last fall.

This vivid re-creation of the penguin's natural habitat, which includes a 185,000gallon tidal pool, allows a nose-to-the-glass view of these flightless birds, whose wings flatten into makeshift flippers for swimming and splashing. An underwater viewing area provides glimpses of the penguins swimming against the current.

The Maryland Zoo has long been known for having one of the country's most successful breeding programs for black-footed penguins. An indoor conservation center houses protected nest boxes, which are designed to grow the penguin colony from 50 to 100 birds.

If Penguin Coast doesn't provide close-enough views, purchase tickets to Penguin Encounter, a private, behind-the-scenes tour with a keeper-guide. The Maryland Zoo's Behind the Scenes program also offers visits into the dwellings of the giraffes, okapis, rhinos, zebras, ostriches and polar bears.

In other zoo bird news: Across from Penguin Coast, the African Boardwalk is the new home for pink Caribbean flamingos. And 10 species of native Maryland birds—including the turkey vulture, wood duck, black-crowned night heron and cattle egret—have been introduced to the recently reconstructed Marsh Aviary, which features a new lily pond. *410-396-7102, marylandzoo.org*
