Open-Air Museums

iss the cultural outings and art exhibitions that premiere in the fall season? Try an open-air museum. Plentiful around the U.S., these are perfect outdoor excursions for breezy autumn days. Ranging from sculpture gardens to street art, here are five to check out:

• Cheekwood Botanical Garden and Museum of Art (Nashville, Tennessee; cheekwood.org), the former estate of Leslie and Mabel Cheek, features 55 acres of sculpture trails and a Japanese botanical garden. During the COVID crisis, the indoor museum and estate are closed.

• **The Neon Museum** (Las Vegas; neonmuseum.org) flashes iconic illuminated signage of old casinos and venues from along the Strip.

• **Brookgreen Gardens** (Murrels Inlet, South Carolina; brookgreen.org) boasts one of the country's largest collections of American figurative sculpture, plus tranquil gardens and a zoo of native lowcountry wildlife.

• **Wynwood Walls** (Miami, Florida; thewynwoodwalls.com) was designed to revitalize a dilapidated warehouse district. The site today has showcased the works of 50 international street artists on 80,000 square feet of outdoor wall space and adjoining gardens.

• The 105-acre **Laumeier Sculpture Park** (St. Louis; laumeiersculpturepark.org) exhibits more than 70 large-scale works within natural surroundings on designated one-way trails.

utdoorsy (outdoorsy .com) is a peer-topeer marketplace that connects travelers with RV owners who are willing to rent out their rides. The site hosts a fleet of 40,000, ranging from easy-tonavigate campervans to vintage Airstreams and luxury models in more than 4,800 cities across 14 countries. RVs provide a self-controlled environment with minimized exposure to others, allowing travelers to avoid public transportation, communal restrooms, and crowded restaurants. Through a highly scrutinized customer evaluation system, owners are held to high cleanliness standards, committing to providing freshly sanitized RVs to renters.
